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Comstock/Comstock/Getty Images To get a certified copy of a lost birth certificate in Quebec, various options are available through the Directeur de l'état civil. It's possible to get a replacement birth certificate in person, by mail or online, provided certain conditions are met. As of January 2020, the average processing time for a replacement birth certificate is 10 working days, but a faster service (three working days) is available at an additional cost. Only the person whose name is on the birth certificate, or someone who has the legal right to obtain the birth certificate (such as an immediate family member), can make the application. Any office of the Directeur de l'état civil can provide a replacement birth certificate. It's necessary to complete the application form with all personal information, plus the information of the person whose birth certificate is being requested. Valid photo ID, such as a Canadian passport or driver's license, plus proof of residence, are required. Payment in person can be by check, money order or by debit/credit card. As of January 2020, the fee for normal processing at a service counter (in person) is \$52.50 (CAD); it is \$74.50 (CAD) for accelerated processing (mailed via Xpresspost, assuming the delivery is in Canada). Subject to certain conditions, a replacement birth certificate may be obtained in 30 minutes at the Directeur de l'état civil service counters in Quebec and Montreal. The clerk at the office counter must be provided with original photo ID and proof of home address documents (the applicant must reside in Canada or the United States). After the application and identifying documents have been reviewed, a transaction receipt is provided. This contains an access number to facilitate completion of the application on site at a self-service computer terminal. If the applicant is eligible for this service, he will receive his documents in less than 30 minutes. Otherwise, his documents will be mailed to him via XpressPost within 24 to 72 hours. The applicant must remain on site while his application is being processed, and be available at all times. As of January 2020, the fee for the 30-minute issuing service is \$64.00. The application form for a copy of a Quebec birth certificate is available to download on the Directeur de l'état civil website. It's possible to enter the information directly into the form before it is printed, but block letters (except for signatures) must be used, with blue or black ink. A check, money order or credit card information must be included with the completed form, which should be mailed to Directeur de l'état civil, 2535, boulevard Laurier, Québec (Québec) G1V 5C6. Photocopies of valid photo ID and proof of residence must be included. As of January 2020, the fee for normal processing by mail is somewhat less than processing directly at a service counter, at \$47.00 (CAD); it is \$69.50 (CAD) for accelerated processing. A citizen of Quebec can submit her application for a replacement birth certificate online. First, she must register with ClicSEQUUR, Quebec's online identity verification service. This involves visiting the Directeur de l'état civil website, choosing "Online Services," and scrolling down to "DEClic! Application for a certificate or copy of an act with ClicSEQUUR." To register for an account, she must provide her nine-digit Social Insurance number, her date of birth and her 11-character notice of assessment number provided on the notice of assessment issued by Revenu Quebec. When she has her DEClic! identifier, she can then apply for a replacement birth certificate online. As of January 2020, the fee is \$32.75 (CAD) for normal processing online and \$64.00 (CAD) for accelerated processing. Quebec is bilingual (French and English). Don't panic if you speak only English and the website comes up in French. At the upper right is a language switch that will say English. So if you're living in the States, but you were born in Canada, here's how to find your birth certificate. Visit Provincial or Territorial Websites Example of a Canadian birth certificate Learn the Canadian province or territory you were born in. If you grew up in the U.S. and have no idea what a territory is, Canadian territories are like U.S. states though they tend to be bigger and there are fewer of them. The 10 Canadian provinces are Ontario, Quebec, Newfoundland, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, British Columbia and Prince Edward Island, sometimes abbreviated to PEI. The three Canadian territories are Yukon Territory, Nunavut and the Northwest Territories. Therefore, learn which of these 13 different regional governments you were born under, then search for that government's Vital Statistics office. In British Columbia, you'll need to search for the British Columbia Services Office. When you reach these websites, search for links or pages like Application for Birth Certificate or Registration Copy. When you find this page, download the application. Complete the Application Provide all the information asked for on the application, which is going to include full name, phone number and home address. If you're filling out the application for a child, get the child's name, gender, date of birth and city of birth correct. Any mistakes can lengthen the process or confuse the bureaucrat, so take care of your part of this transaction. Also provide the full name of the mother and father of the applicant. Add the mother's maiden name and other surnames, and make distinctions, so the officials know which is which. When requesting an application for a child of yours, make sure you know your relationship to the child. Governments aren't likely to release birth records to anyone who makes a request, so this is important. People who can acquire a birth certificate include the following individuals: Child on the Birth Certificate Parent of Children under 19 Legal Guardian of Children under 19 Provincial Government Officials (on as needed basis) Chief Executive Officer working on Behalf of Child on Certificate To prove your role in another person's life, you'll need to submit those documents, too. For example, a copy of guardianship papers would be required for the legal guardian. Provide Proof of Identity When applying for a birth certificate, provide proof of your identity with a valid form of identification. Make a copy of a valid driver's license, your passport, your permanent residence card or your provincial health card (if Canadian). Be Ready to Pay Fees When you mail your application, include fees in the form of check or, better yet, money order. You won't obtain your vital records, after all this trouble, if you don't pay the transaction fee. To ask what fees are, contact online via email, or call the number of the vital records office, which you should be able to find on the online site. Obtaining a Copy of a Canadian Birth Certificate As you see, the Canadian process isn't much different than finding an American birth certificate. Find the territory you were born in, have the proper identification, complete the application and pay the fees. If the marriage or civil union occurred in Quebec, the document can be ordered from the Directeur de l'état civil. If the marriage occurred outside Quebec, you must contact the competent public officer of the place of your marriage ceremony. Show more If you are applying for a record to support a separate application such as obtaining a Passport or Native Status, it is important to check with the organization requesting the document to ensure you obtain the correct document type. All records ordered through this website are certified. Record types that are available to order vary by the province. Birth Family Information Birth Certificate The document of choice for children 16 years of age and under, as it is generally required by government agencies, such as Passport Canada, SGI, Aboriginal Affairs, and for school registration. Includes the individual's full name, date of birth, place of birth, sex, registration number and registration date, PLUS the parents' full names and their province/state and country of birth. Individual Information Birth Certificate Includes the individual's full name, date of birth, place of birth, sex, registration number and registration date and no information about the parents. This certificate may not be ideal for children 16 years of age and under, as many government agencies require the additional information contained on the Family Information certificate. Certified copy of Birth Registration/Restricted Photocopy of Birth Registration A certified photocopy of the original birth registration. Usually this cannot be used as identification but may be required for certain citizenship or immigration documents, if an individual becomes the executor for a foreign estate, or adopts a child. Long Form Birth Certificate For all provinces, except Ontario, the Family Information Certificate is considered the Long Form. Ontario's Long Form is a Certified Copy of the Original Registration. Genealogical (birth)- Includes all of the information that appears on the original birth registration and is stamped "FOR GENEALOGY ONLY". A copy can only be ordered for births registered more than 100 years ago. Marriage Small Marriage Certificate (wallet size)- Includes the full names of each spouse, place of marriage, date of marriage, registration number and date of registration. (Available in select provinces.) Large Marriage Certificate (framing)- Includes the full name of each spouse, place of marriage, date of marriage, registration number and registration date. May or may not include birth places depending on the province of marriage. Certified Copy of Marriage Registration/Restricted Photocopy of Marriage Registration- A certified photocopy of the original birth registration. Usually this cannot be used as identification but may be required for certain citizenship or immigration documents, if an individual becomes the executor for a foreign estate, or adopting a child. Genealogical (marriage)- Includes all of the information appearing on the original marriage registration and is stamped "FOR GENEALOGY ONLY" and can only be ordered for marriages registered more than 75 years ago. Death Death Certificate- Includes the individual's full name, date of death, place of death, sex, registration number and registration date. Certified Copy of Death Registration- A certified photocopy of the original death registration. Genealogical Copy- Includes all of the information appearing on the original death registration, excluding cause of death and is stamped "FOR GENEALOGY ONLY" and can only be ordered for deaths registered more than 70 years ago. Please Note: Cause of Death is not provided on the Certificate or the Registration, with the exception of the Nova Scotia Certified Copy of Death Registration.
