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Mauthe lake campground

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A 29,268 acre glacier gift - the rotating and wooded landscape is dotted with serene lakes and offers a unique outdoor recreational experience of an infinite variety. Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is on State Highway 67, 1/8 miles south of County County G, and is open seven days a week (920) 533-8322. The forest site is at N1765 HWY. G, Campbellsport, WI 53010, and is open on Monday to Friday, 8 A.M. At 4:30 p.m., (262) 626-2116. Directions: The access areas are outside the motorway 23 in Greenbush and motorway 45 in Kewaskum, 6 miles north of West Bend. Features: The northern unit of Moraine State Forest boller is 45 minutes north of Milwaukee. Visitors can explore and enjoy almost 30,000 acres of rolling hills, lakes, forests and prairies. The forest is known internationally for its unique glacial characteristics. Two family campsites, beaches, picnic areas, hiking trails and many other recreational opportunities abound. Campsites (recommended sites in red): Long Lake Campground offers 200 sites, toilets and showers. A private dealer provides firewood when the entrance station is open. Championships accessible to people with disabilities are available. A health dump station and a recycling / garbage station is equipped for recording campers. Long Lake Campground is open for the first weekend campsite in May to October. In the Loop 600-643, sites 601-607 are medium-sized shaded sites that get a small sole filtered through the trees. The 602 site is the field host. The 608 website (photo) is an excellent great campsite, dog legs and shielded by the road with a pine behind it. It has a long driveway with two boulders separating the campsite area from the parking lot and gets solar light patches. Medium-sized Sunny Sites include Numbers 609, 610, 613-617, 619, 624 (Handicap), 625, 627, 628, 634, 636, 628, 634, 636, 637 and 639-642 . The shaded mediosites are 629 and 630. Little sunny sites are 611, 612, 621-623 and 643. sites 619/620 (photo) make up a huge double perfect for groups that want to camp together. The 626 site is small and shaded. The large shaded sites include 631, 632, 635, 638 and 641. The 633 site (photo) is large, grassy and shaded and gets a sunlight filtered by the tree. In the 700-734 cycle, the first sites, 701-707, are small and sunny with dirty floors. The 708-710 sites are beautiful medium-sized Walk-in sites. The 709 site (photo) is the best of the three, very private, with the long walk of about 100 feet. Site 708 (photo) and site 710 (photo) are short walks from the parking lot. The site 725 (photo) is large, deep and private with sunlight patches. The 711-725 sites are large and shaded and receive a filtered sunlight. The 726-734 sites are medium in size and shaded. In the area The small partially sunny sites include 808-815 and 817-821. The 804 site is large and partially sunny with a dirt and a grass floor. The 807 site (photo) is large and shaded with sunlight patches and some large rocks in front. Medium Size Sites Size Numbers 801, 803, 806, 807, 826 and 827. Average shaded sites are 802, 825, 828, 822, 825, 828 and 829. Site 822 (photo) is medium sized, sunny and grassy with boulders in front of the campsite area. Small sunny sites in this area include 823, 824, 833-839, 842, 846-849 and 852-856. The small shady sites are 830-832. Sites 840 and 841 are medium-shadow sites and medium-sized sites include 843, 850 and 851. Site 844 (photo) and site 845 are short walks from the parking lot to a nice medium sized system with lots of grass. In the rather antidescript loop 901-921, sites 901-905, 913 and 914 are small and shaded. The 906-912 sites are small and take some partial sunlight. Site 915 is medium in size and shaded with a ground floor, similar to 918 and 921. There are two medium-sized double or shaded sites: 916/917 and 919/920. In cycle 922-967, site 922 is medium-sized and sunny, as well as sites 925-927 (927 is a disabled site), 928-933, (site 933 is next to the beach path), 935, 936-939, 941, 943, 945 (opposite the Summit Nature Trail), 947, 948, 950 and 958. Medium-sized shaded sites include numbers 923, 924, 934, 940, 964 and 966. Site 937 (photo) and site 939 are medium sized, open and sunny sites overlooking the lake through the trees behind them. Small shaded sites include 942, 944, 946, 949, 957, 946, 949, 957, 961 and 963. Small sunny sites are 952-956, 959, 960, 962 and 965 (next to a pine stand). Site 967 (photo) is a medium-sized site, partially sunny with a pine tree behind it. Mauthe Lake Campground has 137 sites, including 49 electrical sites, a shower and toilet for vault. The beach has playground equipment and concessions are available for food supplies and camping, jet ski rental and firewood. Campsites on Lake Mauthe offer more variety than any other campground in the State Park system. In the 100, which are close to the lake and a short walk to the beach, site 101 (photo) is a superb walk-in a long flight of stairs to a hill tent of medium size, mostly shaded and private. Site 102 is the teepee site (photo) on a small shady hill. Site 103 is the host of the campsite and site 104 is small and shady next to the lake with a water fountain next to it. Sites 105 and 106 are small, open and sunny sites in the middle of the loop overlooking the lake. The site 107 is right next to the lake trail, and as sites 108-110, it is a small electric site outside the cycle with a nice lake view. In the 200, small shaded sites include 201-204 and 206-208. Site 205 (photo) is large, shady and deep close to the toilets. Site 209 (photo) and site 210 are excellent shaded and medium sized walk-in on the hills just a short distance from the car parks along the road. Sites 211-214 are small shaded electric sites. Sites 215-220 and site 223, are small and shady, overlooking the lake on the other side of the road. Sites 221 and 222 are small and shady, with short routes to the lake across the road. In 300, the site 301 (photo) is a short walk to a sunny site of medium size built on the side of a hill. The site 302 (photo) and the site 303 are short access to medium-sized sites, shaded by pine trees; the sites are visible from each other but shielded from the road and would constitute a great double site. Sites 304 and 305 are also a little too close, but these shady L-shaped sites would be a good sooy for groups of people who want to camp close. The sites 306, 308 and 310-312 are small shady sites near the road. The site 307 is a medium-sized open site built on the side of a hill, similar to the site 309, which is more shaded. Site 313 (photo) is a large shady, deep and private site. All sites in this circuit are close to a building with central shower. In the 400s, the smaller shady areas are 401-406, 408, 409, 416-424, and 426-430. The site 407 is large and shaded, deep and private, and is close to the water fountain and well toilets. The sites from 410 to 415 are located on their own small ring. The 410 and 411 (photo) sites are open, grassy and sunny and could be a good double site for groups. The site 412 (photo) at the end of the loop is a deep and shady L-shaped site with good privacy. The 413-415 sites are small, shaded and close to the road. The site 425 is medium sized and shaded under tall trees, but it is a little close to the road. The 431 and 432 sites are two other open and sunny sites, large and deep, but close to each other and could be a good double site. I am close to a parking lot with toilets and access to the Tamarack path. In the 1500s, small shady sites include numbers 501-503, 507, 509, 533, 537-540, 544-550, and 552-559. The small shady sites in a pine forest are 516-520. The 505 and 506 sites are small and sunny. The site 504 is a huge, deep and shady site with a long driveway. The medium-sized shady areas include 508 (on the hill, suitable for campers), 510 (partially sunny, in front of the toilet), 511, 514, 515, 542, 543 and the medium-sized shady areas in the pine forest 512, 521, 522 and 524. The site 513 (photo) is a large, deep and shaded site in the pine forest with a large parking lot. The site 523 (photo) is wide, airy and shaded, with a partial view of the lake between the trees. Small sunny sites include numbers 525, 526 (on a hill), 527-531 (in front of the well baths), 532 (open and sunny on a hill) and 536. Medium-sized sunny sites are 534 and 535. Two large shady spots near the end of the cycle are 541 (very deep) and 551 (on a hill). Site 551 and nearby sites are close to the paths leading south to the Ice Age Trail. Refugees for backpacks are available all year round to camp rustics along the 31,65 miles of the national scenic path of the ice age and along the Zillmer path. Each site offers aCovered trail, ring of fire and well toilets. Registered campers can collect dead and felled trees for firewood. These sites are not accessible by car. All camping equipment must be packed and all waste must be packed. A camping permit is required and you must camp at a designated shelter campsite. Greenbush Greenbush Campground offers nine outdoor sites accommodating groups of up to 60 people. Only tent camping is allowed on the actual camping. Sites are located near the Greenbush Trails where campers can enjoy hiking or off-road cycling. Nearby is available a fenced building, hand pumps and toilets. Greenbush Group Campground is open for camping from April to November. The new Prospect Knights' Field is centrally located on the 33-mile Bridle Trail that winds through the state forest. Campers with horses can enjoy 12 family sites, 3 group sites, a picnic shelter, drinking water and well toilets. A 48-seat horse shelter building is available for campers, and each site includes tether seats. Call for more information. Map of Kettle Moraine North Map of Mauthe Lake Campground Map of Long Lake Campground Trails: Butler Lake Loop: On Butler Lake Road, 1.5 miles east of Long Lake Recreation Area, the Butler Lake Trail winds over 3 miles through the 158-acre Butler Lake and Flyms Spring State Natural Area. Part of the hike path is shared with the Ice Age Trail. The interpreter displays are set at the base of the esker and overlook Butler Lake. A picnic table, grill and drinking water are located on the trail. (Photo of the launch of the Butler Lake boat). Greenbush Loop System: On Kettle Moraine Drive, 2.5 miles north of State Hwy. 67, the Greenbush Trail is a combination of 4 cycle routes for a total of 9 miles. Seasonal, hikers share these cycle routes with off-road bikers. In winter the trails are cared for cross-country skiing. (Hello is forbidden when snow is present.) A heated picnic shelter, picnic tables, grill, drinking water and vaulted toilets are close to the trail. The New Fane Loop System: On County Line Road, 1.5 miles east of Kettle Moraine Drive, the New Fane Trail is a series of moderately challenging cycle trails for a total of 5.5 miles. A short path of connectors allows access to the Ice Age Trail. Hikers and off-road bikers share this multi-purpose trail system in season. Cross-country skiing comes with snow. (Hello is forbidden when snow is present.) Parnell Loop: on Hwy County. U, a quarter mile west of Hwy A County, the Parnell Tower Trail begins its 3.5-mile loop with a series of passages leading to the highest elevation point in the forest. There is a 60-foot lookout tower (photo) rises above the floors of trees for a bird's eye view of the glacial landscape. The trail follows the Ice Age trail near a rustic backpack shelter. Tables, grills, drinking water and vaulted toilets are adjacent to the track. Zillmer Loop System: on Hwy County. SS, one Mile west of Hwy County. G, the Zillmer Trail Area consists of 4 cycle routes for a total of 8 miles. The southern trail has picnic tables, barbecues and drinking water. Visitors can also access the trail from the Ice Age Visitor Centre. A rustic backpack shelter is located along the trail. In winter it is a Cross-country skiing track. (Hiking is prohibited when snow is present.) Closed to hunting with firearms, except during the deer gun and Turkey's spring seasons. Ice Age Trail: About 31 miles of the National Ice Age Scenic Trail travels the length of the forest. The course from moderate to difficult follows the sinuous towels and fallen moraines descending into swamps and deep kettles. Nature Trails: Tamarack Circle Trail: At the recreational area of Lake Mauthe, this easy 2-mile, 2-mile self-guided trail encircles Lake Mauthe. The trail meanders through a portion of the Milwaukee River 800 acres and marsh wilderness area (pictures of red pines along the Tamarack Trail). Summit Nature Trail: The trail is located near site 944 at the long lake campsite. This 1-mile loop climbs to the top of Dundee Mountain (Long Lake photos from the Dundee Mountain Summit), the largest Kame in the forest, providing a panoramic view of Drumlins Campbellsport and the long lake. Moraine Trail: Located at the Reuss Ice Age Information Center, this easy 3/4 mile cycle is marked with numbered posts. A nature trail booklet, available at the trail, identifies the common trees of the moraine kettle and their uses. The trail follows the Interlobata moraine created by the Lobe Green Bay Glacier. Areas of Special Interest: Greenbush Kettle - on Kettle Moraine Drive, 1 mile north of Highway 67. An outstanding example of a hole in the ice kettle. A panoramic view, the display coating and the interpretive display is within walking distance from the parking lot. Haskell Noyes Memorial Woods - on Highway GGG south of Highway SS. A historical marker greets visitors to this 67-acre state natural area. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Vision Area and is included in the national "Watchlife Wildlife" program. Vista Trail overlooks the Henry S. Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center (visitor center photo from Vista Trail). A short climb of stairs and you arrive at an observation deck overlooking a beautiful view from which you can see Drumlins, Eskers and Mo Moraines. Jersey Flats Prairie - on Highway SS, 1/4 miles west of New Perspective Village. This restored prairie is a glacial outwaster plain. This area is designated as a Wisconsin Wildlife Vision Area and is included in the national "Watchlife Wildlife" program. Little Mud Lake - on Highway SS, 1/2 miles east of Highway GGG. This site is a state habitat conservation area and is vital for the long-term survival of the red, spotted, spotted, and tiger salamanders that thrive here. A picnic table and a grill are provided at the small parking lot. Dundee Kame, A.k.a Bianco Kame - on Highway F, Miles east of Dundee, AK. White Kame, is located within a natural area of the state of 468 acres. This conical Moulin Kame is known throughout the world by geology students and is often depicted in geology textbooks due to its almost perfect form. Kame field - near the intersection of the V motorway and from deer street looking north. The view at the mile level of spectacular kame field is breathtaking. Visitors can see and experience rock, rubble and gravel "inside" of a kame. Abete Lago Palude State Natural-North area of Dundee on Airport Road, 1/2 mile west of Vista Drive. This area is designated as the Wisconsin Wildlife Viewing Area and is included in the national program "Watchable Wildlife". Visitors must stay on the pedestrian path due to the fragility of the swampy plants, the presence of poisonous sum and the instability of the swampy surface. Off-Road Bike Trails: Includes the Greenbush Loop system and the new Fane Loop system. The off-road bike is only allowed on the Greenbush ring paths (9 miles) and New Fane (5.5 miles). Normally these paths are open from end of April to November, depending on the conditions of the route. Horse routes: The equestrians enjoy 39 miles of bridges which are traditionally open from late April to mid November depending on the conditions of the route. The main path winds along the linear length of the forest of 33 miles. Two ring paths, Crooked and Forest Lake, provide shorter routes for a total of 6 miles. Cross-country skiing paths: a total of 17 miles of cross-country skiing trails prepared mechanically are available for diagonal skiers and skateboards. Pets and hiking are not allowed on the ski slopes. A Shelter House heated log and hill slide are open to the public at the Greenbush Recreation Area. Swimming: The state forest has three beaches, one at Lake Mauthe (photo) and two at Lake Long (photo). There are no toilets. Pets, soaps, foods and beverages banned in the marked bathing areas. Fishing: You can fish in any of the eight lakes of the forest: Auburn Lake a.k.a. Lake Fifteen, Butler Lake, Crooked Lake, Forest Lake, Kettle Moraine Lake a.k.a. Round Lake, Lake Seven, Long Lake, and Mauthe Lake. The eight lakes listed above are located inside or bordering the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit. These lakes, which vary in size from 427 hectares (Long Lake) to less than seven hectares, accounting for a total of 786 hectares. The species of primary fish in these lakes include largemouth bass, perch sun, crappies, and northern pike. Trota can be found in Watercress Creek and Lake Fifteen Creek. Mauthe Lake (photo) and Long Lake (photo) The recreational areas have fishing docks accessible to people with motor disabilities. Canoeing: Public access is provided on the lakes of the forest by a well-developed boat landing or walk-in access (photo of the launch of the Long Lake boat) - (photo of the launch of the Mauthe Lake boat). A private dealer provides various types of water bikes for fishing in some of these lakes. Lake Seven, Mauthe, Forest and Butler Lakes prohibit the use of gas engines. Other restrictions may applynavigation. Parkview General Store offers a fleet of rowboats and canoes for fishing or simply for paddle. It also has three funyaks and two four-seater pedal. Most floating boats are at Mauthe Lake Recreational boat landing area; However, rowing boats are also found in Lake Seven, forest forest Auburn Lake. To rent a boat, go to the Parkview General Store located on the Hwy GGG, 2/10 miles north of Mauthe Lake Recreation entrance road area. After receiving the rental costs, you will be provided a key to unlock your rental in the boat launching area. A personal floating device for each person is included in the rental. Kettle Moraine Scenic Drive: visitors can enjoy the beauty, variety and geology of the State Forest of Kettle Moraine in the south-east of Wisconsin by driving Kettle Moraine Scenic Drive. The 115 miles unit crosses six Wisconsin counties. Its northern end is near the Elkhart lake in northern Sheboygan County and its southern end is at Whitewater Lake in Southeast Walworth County. There are numerous places for picnics, excursions, field, bike, swimming, fish, visit historical sites, shop and find accommodation along the way. Wildlife: Bird watchers can spot flyers, northern Waterthrush, Bobolink, Dickcissel, eastern Meadowlark, Northern Harrier, Vireos, hooded warbler, pilate woodpecker, scarlet tanager, and many types of Raptors. The forest is particularly active during spring and autumn migrations. Other highlights: Reuss Ice Age Visitor Center is located on a kilometer west of Dundee on State Highway 67 and offers forest information, interpretative exhibitions and a 20-minute Ice Age movie. Naturalist programs are scheduled throughout the year. Group interpreting programs are available upon request. Mauthe Lake Concession is located in the recreation area of Lake Mauthe near the playground equipment, swimming beach and picnic building. Long Lake Food Concession is located in the long lake recreation area in south-west corner of South Beach Parking. The forest has two designated areas as dog training areas. The Wet Dog Training area, located on the Division Road south of Hwy F, is recommended for training water skills; While the driving dog training area, located on Hwy U east of Hwy A, should be used for developing Upland bird skills.
