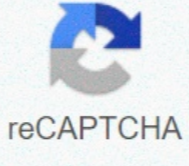

His father was a newspaper editor (a frost profession then practiced himself, among others), and his mother was a teacher and a Scottish immigrant. When he was about ten years old, his family moved to Massachusetts to be close to his grandfather, who possessed a sawmill. Frost has been named both the Valuedicatorian and the "class poeta" of its degree class of high school ... and two years later he published his first poem, "My Butterfly: an elegy", in the New York independent magazine. At this point, frost knew that he wanted to be a poet. But unfortunately, the next segment of Frost's life would have been marked with upheavals. He participated in Dartmouth and Harvard, but abandoned both before graduating. The poetry of him was not gaining traction in the United States. To further complicate things, frost and wife of him, Elinor, suffered the personal tragedy when two of their six children died in childhood. In 1900, feeling frustrated by his work prospects and the lack of traction in his career of poetry, the frost moved his family a farm left to him from his grandfather to Derry, New Hampshire. The frost would live there for nine years, and many of his most famous early poems were written before his morning chores while he tends to the farm. But Frost's poetry was still largely neglected by American publishers. As a result, Frost has decided to sell the farm in 1911 and transferred his family to London. He was there he published his first anthology of poetry, the will of a boy, in 1913. The second anthology of the frost, north of Boston, was published in 1914 and found a massive success in England. Finally, after years of struggle, the frost became a famous poet essentially during the night. To avoid the Second World War, frost returned to the United States in 1915 and started teaching the Amherst College and the University of Michigan, all the time I continue to write poems. He received numerous awards and awards, including the Pulitzer Prize for Poetry and became the public face of the 20th century American poetry. In the late life, at 86, Robert Frost has also become the first inaugural poet in the inauguration of John F. Kennedy in 1960. In all his career, frost never moved from old pastoral poetry, despite the fact that the new American poets moved to a more experimental direction. So the most common structure for English-speaking poetry is iambic pentameter, which means that the most common foot is a iamb, and there are five heaps per line. The voice of a poem is an artificial construct, a character created to give the poem a certain effect. So how does this voice create? First of all, note that the poem is firsthand. This means that we would have obtained the prospect of the speaker in their own words, reported by their use of first-person pronouns as "I". Furthermore, the public has not been addressed directly (as in Maya Angelou "Still greeting). Instead, it is as if we had to intrude the rapporteur's thoughts while they raise on the potential ramifications of the choice of a path to another.
